CANADA'S FEDERAL ELECTION: OCTOBER 19, 2015

Canada has federal (national) elections once every four years or so. This is the opportunity for Canadian citizens to vote for people who will represent them in the House of Commons (parliament) in Ottawa. This year, the election will take place on October 19, 2015.

The people who are elected are called Members of Parliament (MPs). Currently, there are 308 MPs and, after this election, there will be 338. Canada's population has increased in the last 10 years, so we need more people to represent us at the federal level.

The federal government is responsible for areas such as national defence, foreign affairs, federal taxes, employment insurance and the post office, as well as others.

Each MP is responsible for a certain area, called a "riding". In this area, there are three ridings: Bay of Quinte, Northumberland-Peterborough South and Hastings-Lennox and Addington. Only one person becomes an MP from each riding. This is the person who gets the most votes in the election.

Most MPs are members of a political party. In Canada, the main parties are the Conservatives, who currently form the government, the Liberals, the New Democratic Party (NDP) and the Green Party. There are also several independent MPs.


To be able to vote in the election, you need to be a Canadian citizen. You must prove your identity and address. There are a couple of ways to do this. You must either show your driver's licence or other government identification with your photo, name and current address. Another option is to show two documents from the following list, found at the link here (Elections Canada website):

If you are registered to vote in the election, you will receive a "voter information card" before October 1st, 2015. It tells you when and where you can vote. The card looks like this:



TIPS TO LEARN ENGLISH

Here are a series of tips for learning English, or any other language for that matter. These are tips that are adapted from different sources on the Internet:

- Know why you're learning the language: If you always keep in mind why 1. you're learning the language-to make friends, get a better job, enjoy your life in Canada more etc., it is easier to stay motivated.
- **Jump in:** Whatever method(s) you use to learn a language, it is important 2. to surround yourself in that language every day. You can listen to English on the radio, write e-mails in it. Use every opportunity to practice.
- 3. **Find a partner:** Just as some people go to the gym with a "buddy", having a language "buddy" is helpful, too. You can keep each other motivated and push each other a bit. A little bit of competition is good!
- **Keep it relevant:** You have to keep reminding yourself that the reason you are learning the lan-4. guage is to communicate with others in real-life situations. Always remembering this can help you from losing your focus or getting too wrapped up in textbooks, for example.
- **Make it enjoyable:** Try to do enjoyable things with the language you are learning. For example, 5. you can try writing a poem, drawing a comic strip, writing a song. If it's not enjoyable, you might not continue.
- Be like a child: Children are not necessarily better language learners than adults, but they have 6. some qualities that make it easier: they are not self-conscious about making mistakes, they treat it like a game and they are not inhibited. If we can give up our fear or making mistakes and wondering what others will think if we make a mistake, we will be more relaxed and better learners.
- Get out of your "comfort zone": Do things in the language that make you slightly uncomfortable-7. speak with strangers, try to order food in the language etc. By doing this, you will feel more comfortable to try more. You have to push yourself a bit and overcome your fears.
- Listen: Before you can speak any language, you have to listen to it first. You have to hear unfamil-8. iar sounds many times before you are able to make them yourself. If you listen long enough, you will hear how these sounds are supposed to be pronounced.



9. Watch native speakers talking: Language is a physical act. If you closely watch native speakers speaking their language, you will see how they move their mouths, lips etc. when they make certain sounds. If you can't find any native speakers, watch foreign language movies or TV shows.

10. Talk to yourself: If you can't find anyone to talk to, talk to yourself in the target language. That is a good way to remember new phrases.

This fall, try some of these tips. Good luck with your language learning. Learning the language of the place you live is very rewarding.

NEWCOMERS SETTLING IN SMALL TOWNS

Many smaller places in Ontario and Canada are trying to attract immigrants. They want to boost their economies and reverse the population decline from smaller, rural areas.

Presently, about 35% of Canada's population lives in three places—Toronto, Montreal and Vancouver. Roughly 75% of newcomers to Canada settle in larger cities. However, more and more immigrants are choosing to live in smaller places. Some of the reasons are: cheaper housing prices and opportunities to set up a business. As well, newcomers to smaller places often integrate more quickly, as they have more Canadian friends and contacts.

As more newcomers settle in smaller areas, these areas then become more comfortable for other newcomers. Also, a greater number of immigrants settling in smaller places brings about the creation of services to assist newcomers. The number of such services in big cities is one of the main reasons why immigrants choose larger centres.


To help with attracting immigrants to smaller centres and closing gaps in services, Citizenship and Immigration Canada created Local Immigration Partnerships (LIPs). These are groups of concerned, involved services and businesses in different communities who try to improve integration for newcomers by promoting social, political and civic participation. They realize that immigration is important and integrating newcomers into the community is good for everyone.

Some communities have been more active in trying to recruit skilled newcomers. The town of Morden, Manitoba, for example, has an immigration initiative and works with clients who are going to make a provincial nominee application. By doing this, Morden has filled a lot of employment vacancies.

Simcoe County, Ontario, like Morden, also identifies newcomers who have already settled in larger communities but who might be willing to consider moving to a smaller place if the conditions are right.

Smaller towns, while they lack some of the entertainment and services of larger places are often safe, calm, pleasant places to live and raise a family.
