



CHANGES TO CITIZENSHIP RULES

Citizenship and Immigration Canada has made official changes to the Citizenship application and rules which came into effect on June 11, 2015. Check with QUIS before applying for Citizenship! The changes are the following:

New application

If you printed an application from the CIC website before June 11, 2015, it is no longer valid. You will need to get the new application form.You must also fill out the Physical Presence calculator on-line and print it off when finished. This will show how long you have lived in Canada.

Age

Persons between the ages of 14 and 65 must show proof of their language abilities at Canadian Language Benchmark (CLB) Level 4 AND
 Persons between the ages of 14 and 65 must write the Citizenship test.

Time spent in Canada

You must have lived in Canada for 4 years in the past 6 years. Of those four years, you must have been in Canada for 183 days of each of those 4 years.
As mentioned above, all applicants must fill in the ON-LINE Physical Presence calculator and print off the result for your application.
Only time spent in Canada AFTER you became a permanent resident can count towards your citizenship.
Time spent in Canada does not apply to minors under the age of 18.

Filing Income Taxes

You must have filed your income taxes for at least 4 of the six years previous to sending your application for citizenship (if you are required to file income taxes in general).

Intent to live in Canada

You must make a declaration on your application that you intend to: live in Canada **OR** work outside Canada as a Crown servant (work for the Canadian government), **OR** live abroad with certain Canadian family members who are Crown servants

Languages

You must show that you have knowledge of English or French. You must have Canadian Language Benchmark Level 4 for your English or French test. You can supply a high school or college or university diploma if you studied in English. You can supply a LINC certificate if you studied LINC at an ESL school.

Prohibitions

If you have committed **a crime inside or outside Canada** you may not be eligible to become a Canadian citizen for a period of time.



This is a part of immigration faced by almost all immigrants.

Here are some tips to help you manage the challenges of living in a new country:

1. Stay Positive (A Key Tip For New Immigrants) Coming to Canada, finding work and integrating into a new society can be very challenging. People who stay positive about their new experiences or see them as an adventure will be more able to handle the stresses of settling in Canada.

2. Learn English

Many new immigrants speak English but they need to perfect their English to communicate with others and do well in the Canadian workplace. Other than ESL/LINC classes, make friends with native speakers, or join groups to improve your English.

3. Embrace Canada

You have made a big move to come to Canada – be a part of your new country and know as much as you can about it – whether it be news, sports or politics. This is your country now.

4. Have Another Plan (Plan B)

Everyone comes to Canada with the goal of working in the profession they had in their home country. Canadians would call that "Plan A". To ensure that you are successful, you need to also have "Plan B". Plan B is something else that you would do if you couldn't meet your original goals in Canada. Be open to the idea of taking risks and changing your original plans.

5. Make Friends with People Outside Your Ethnic Group Immigrants who integrate into the Canadian workplace and Canadian life the best are those who make friends with people from all ethnic groups. Canada is a very multi-cultural country. Be open to making friends with people from all religious and cultural groups.

6. Volunteer, Mentor, Network

The way to finding work and succeeding in Canada is being involved in the community, volunteering with different professional associations, charities and causes that are important to you. This will build a network of people that will help you ensure your success in Canada in the present and future.
